# Crafts Council announces the selected makers for the sixth year of Hothouse

The Crafts Council has selected 41 maker businesses to take part in the six-month <a href="Hothouse">Hothouse</a> programme, delivered in partnership across the UK. For 2016 makers cover a broad range of disciplines including twelve jewellers, twelve ceramists, seven textile makers and five furniture makers.

As the Craft Council's creative and business development programme for up-and-coming makers; Hothouse has quickly established itself as a gold-standard professional development programme. Over the last five years 163 participants have taken part in the programme with a 100% of makers in 2015 stating that the programme had enabled them to think differently about the direction of their career.

This year the Crafts Council has partnered with 25 organisations across the UK including Manchester School of Art, Craft Scotland, University of Brighton, and The National Centre for Craft and Design. The 41 maker businesses selected already display a high level of technical craftsmanship and originality. Hothouse will further equip them with the business and creative skills needed to run a successful and sustainable craft business.

#### Participants include;

- <u>Rebecca Sarah Black</u> is a contemporary jewellery designer and bone smith who
  creates statement, sculptural and wearable jewellery. Her work is inspired by
  notions of identity and traditional Scottish folklore.
- <u>Kira Meyer</u> works with glass and seeks to challenge the viewer by depicting social issues which are represented through her sculptural work. Kira also experiments within design by fusing digital media with traditional craft processes such as photogrammetry, 3D print and casting.
- <u>Jacky Puzey</u> is a creative digital embroiderer specialising in an artisan approach to digital embroidery and creating bespoke pieces for interiors and fashion. Inspired by shared histories, fashion, cultures, places, and memory; Jacky challenges the perception of digital embroidery within contemporary craft.

- Arjan van Dal is a ceramicist who likes to explore the quality of the material by stretching it to its limits such as throwing very thin in porcelain and very chunky stoneware pieces. Arjan gains inspiration from architecture and Jindezhen porcelain which reflect the two main elements of form and function that influences his work.
- Thomas Whittingham is a furniture maker that draws inspiration from the British countryside and modern day architecture. The pairing of these design elements together creates contemporary furniture that sits harmoniously in both modern and more traditional settings. Thomas uses native timber where possible in combinations of the same species that contrast in colouration and grain.
